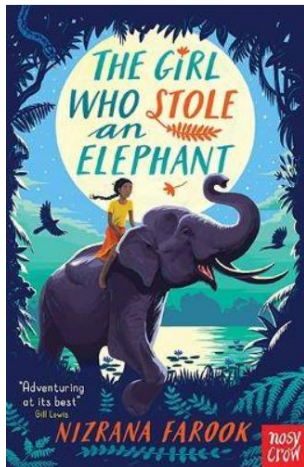


Reading – Fiction

Magical Marlborough



History – Marlborough

In history, the children will be going back in time to learn all about the magical history of Marlborough. We will take an adventure through Marlborough investigating all of the blue plaques and will be visiting St Peter's church tower. The children will learn about the history that occurs right on their door step from the Great Fire of Marlborough to the history of St Peter's church and the links to King John.



English

This term we will be concentrating on how to use the following in our writing:

Adjectives, possessive apostrophes, subordinating conjunctions, similes, past tense verbs, adverbs, prepositions of place and time, and inverted commas.

The children will be writing a diary entry based on The Girl Who Stole an Elephant

We should all now be familiar with using our 'Non-negotiables' of capital letters and full stops at the start and end of sentences and proof reading our writing to ensure our sentences are cohesive and make sense.



Science – Light

In science, year 3 will learn about light. They will understand that light travels in a straight line and when light hits an object it is reflected (bounces off). It is the reflected light bouncing off into our eyes that allows us to see the object. Different surfaces and materials will reflect light differently, some better than others. Reflective surfaces and materials can be very useful such as high-visibility jackets and cat's eyes.

Key Vocabulary

Light	A form of energy that travels in a wave from a source.
Light Source	An object that makes its own light.
Dark	Dark is the absence of light.
Reflection	The process where light hits the surface of an object and bounces back into our eyes.
Reflect	To bounce off.
Reflective	A word to describe something which reflects light well.
Ray	Waves of light are called light rays. They can also be called beams.
Pupil	The black part of the eye which lets light in.
Shadow	An area of darkness where light has been blocked.
Opaque	Describes objects that do not let any light pass through them.
Translucent	Describes objects that let some light through, but scatter the light so we can't see through them properly.
Transparent	Describes objects that let light travel through them easily, meaning that you can see through the object.

PSHE – Changing Me

In PSHE, the children will learn about the changes in themselves and other people as they grow up. They also talk about who they can go to for help and to talk to about any potential worries they may have. They explore the changes that happen both inside of the body and outside of the body. They develop an understanding that everybody is special and unique.

PE

This term, year 3 will start to learn cricket where we will be learning to catch and field as well as batting and bowling.

The children will also be taking part in a series of different sports and then finally taking part in Sports Day!

RE – Hinduism

In RE, we are continuing to learn about Hinduism and the importance that water plays within the religion. We will be taking pilgrimage to The River Ganges and understand what it might be like to be a pilgrim in any religion.



Art – Sketching

We will be researching different impressionist, such as Claude Monet, to create artwork through sketching using graded pencils and blending pastels.



Music – Jazz

This unit is about Jazz music, including the styles of Ragtime, Traditional jazz and Swing. It was started by African-Americans in New Orleans, who mixed African and European musical styles together to create the Jazz style.



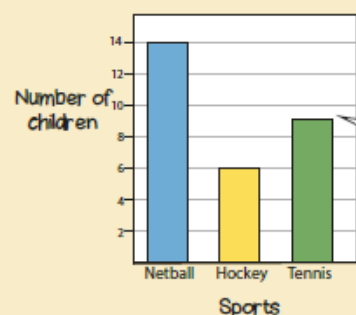

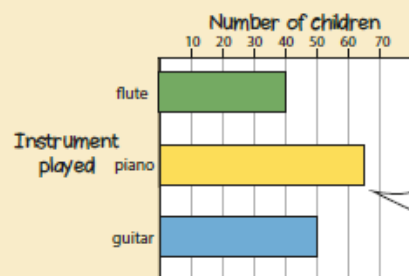

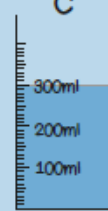
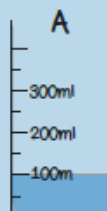

A is half as long as B



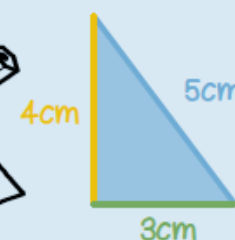
C weighs 4 times as much as A

The angle is less than a right angle



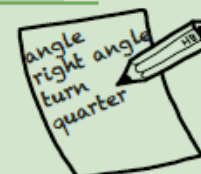
The angle is more than a right angle
